Please let us know if you have concerns about the behaviour of another person's child while they are at school or on school related activities.

Raising your concerns directly with the child (or his or her parents while they are at school) could result in your access to the school site being restricted or withdrawn.

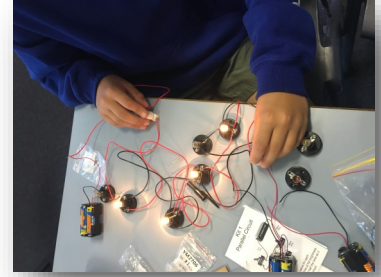

Science & Technology



Electricity in 5/6 Purple

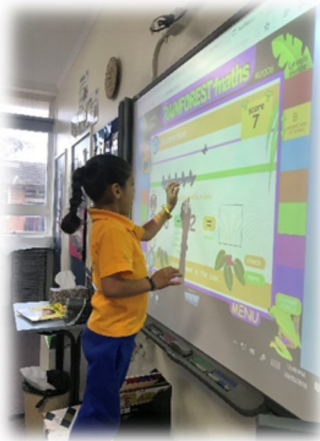
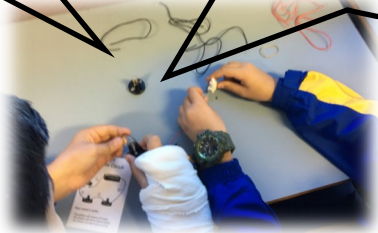
Stage 3 have been studying Electricity as part of the Science and Technology unit. This included how electrical circuits work. Two students explain how electrical circuits provide a means of transferring and transforming electricity through constructing simple circuits.

We used copper wires red and black wires also batteries and a switch to work some light bulbs. There were metal on the light bulbs that made the light bulbs stand up. There was an insulator around the wires to make the wires not hurt or burn you.

Sorry Day - May 26th

National Sorry Day is an Australia-wide observance held on May 26 each year. This day gives people the chance to come together and share the steps towards healing for the Stolen Generations, their families and communities. Stolen generations refer to Indigenous Australians who were forcibly removed from their families and communities.

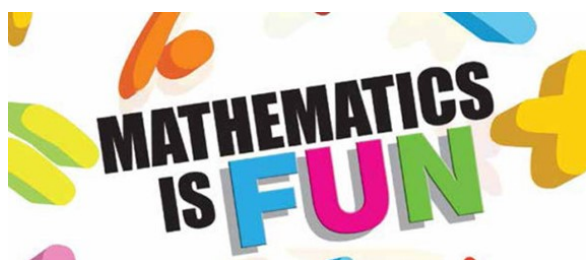
On Friday we explored Sorry day by reading the story "Sorry Day" which is a story of a little girl getting lost in a crowd and feeling frightened and scared because she couldn't find her mum. Through this we discussed the feelings children may have felt being part of the stolen generation. The dragonflies think they would have felt sad, scared and lonely. The book explored Kevin Rudds apology to the Indigenous community of Australia who were taken from their homes many years ago.



We then explored further into the Aboriginal culture by looking at aboriginal art in the form of painting and drawing. We discussed the colours they saw and techniques such as dots that were used. Mrs Cummins read some Aboriginal stories and we watched a time lapse YouTube video of an Aboriginal artist completing a painting. We used this as inspiration to decorate our hand prints.



In the afternoon we further explored the Aboriginal culture using musical instruments. The children were introduced to clapping sticks, a gyro and a scrapper. As a group we listened to a song with a didgeridoo and played along with our instruments.



Make a Temperature Tracker

Winter has hit with a cold blast. Why not track how cold it really is each day. Your child will be exercising key analytical skills by developing graphing skills and interpreting data. They will become a master temperature tracker.

What You Need:

Access to an on-line weather website or app, paper, pencils, ruler

What You Do:

Your child records the daily temperature highs and lows for one week.

Display the data, using headings: days of the week, highs and lows.

Discuss how your child could set up using a graph. Use different colours for high and low temperatures.

Any student bringing in their temperature tracker in by Wednesday 4 July will receive a special gift.

Booktalk!

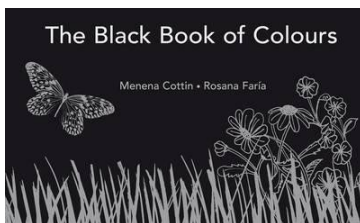


The Book With No Pictures! – B. J. Novak
