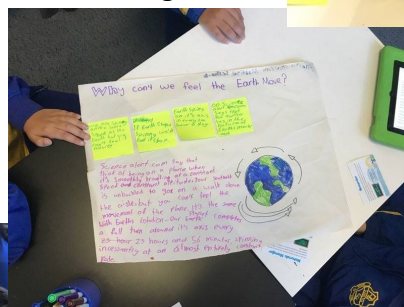
SOLE

Students self-organise themselves into groups, negotiate roles and responsibilities and research the answer using digital technologies. 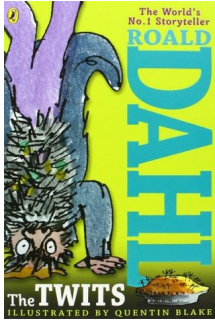

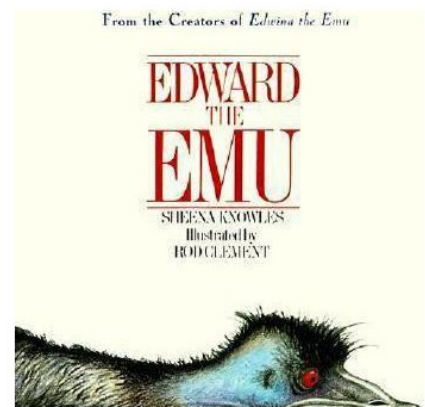
How To Turn Ugly

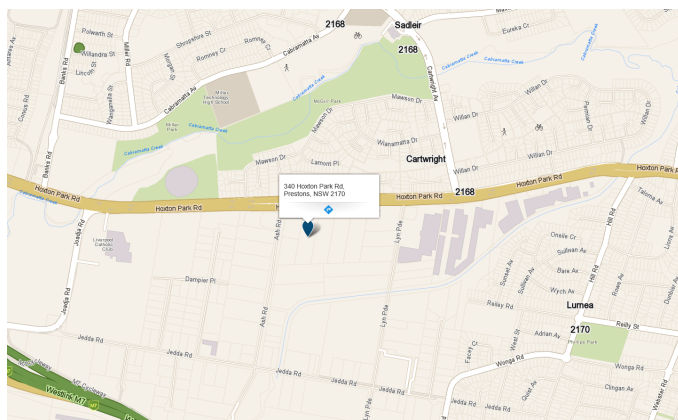


Sadleir Public School School Uniform

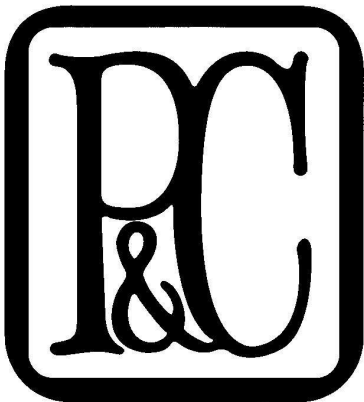
