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Principal Report

Dear Parents

Term 3 has been a very successful term for our students, staff and parents and I would like to thank and congratulate all members of our school learning community on their contributions to Sadleir Public School.

Term 3 highlights have included:

- 1. **Student attendance.** Our attendance rates in 2018 are at 95%. This is 3 percentage points higher than 2017. Thanks for helping your children get to school everyday.
- Stage 2 and 3 overnight camps/excursions. Students had new learning and social experiences
- 3. **Parents.** The P&C organised and ran several successful events including the school disco. Parents also participated in valuable forums and workshops and an end of term excursion.
- 4. **NAIDOC 2168**. Over 45 students attended a combined NAIDOC celebration K-12 at Miller.
- 5. **Special education unit Sailability Program.** Students participated in a 5 week sailing course at the Sydney Regatta Centre.
- 6. **Year 3 NAPLAN**. Our year 3 students performed extremely well with a significant number of students achieving above the national average.
- Staff development. Staff attended a great mathematics evening session this week and K-2 teachers have all but completed their intensive litercy PL for 2018.
- 8. **Big events.** Sadleir very successfully organised the district athletics carnival and the 2018 Bookweek celebrations. Feedback has been very positive.
- 9. Public speaking and spelling. Students competed in school based competitions and 6 students represented at a regional level. Ahmad G won the stage 3 Liverpool/Glenfield final with a great impromtu speech on gun control.
- 10. **Helping farmers**. Students and parents banded together to raise over \$1000 for drought affected farmers.

Today is the last day of Term 3. I would like to thank the Sadleir Public School staff for their outstanding work this term and their ongoing commitment. We hope that you have a great holiday break and enjoy quality family time together. We look forward to students returning on Monday 15th October refreshed and motivated to continue their learning.

Staff of the Sadleir PS Support Unit attended a fundraising night on August 31st. The Gary Walden Fundraising Event raises money for Special Education in South West Sydney.

The Gary Walden Fund was established in 2007 under the auspice of the Department of Education, to raise funds to enable projects that build capacity for special needs children within our public schools.

Gary Walden was the Director for Schools, Macarthur and the fund was established after his passing to continue the work he pioneered. The fund is managed by volunteers and started with \$10,000.00, contributed by mourners in lieu of flowers at Gary's funeral.

The fund has relied on fundraising and donations since its commencement. All funds raised by the Gary Walden Fund are directed back into the school community to enhance the learning of children with special needs through grants to purchase resources and fund creative programs. Each year the number of requests for funding far exceeds the money raised.

Each year funds raised support a total of 18 individual projects in public schools across Campbelltown, Camden, Wollondilly, & Liverpool.

Top tips to keep kids reading over the holidays


Research clearly shows that when kids put down school books on their break, their reading ability also drops with it. Teachers in Australia also frequently report that students return to school after their break with a lower reading level and interest in books, than when they left previously. Therefore it's vital that we continue to encourage our children to read widely and often whilst they are on holidays.

Here are my top tips to make sure your kids stay engaged with reading over the school break.

1. Make reading time fun (and quick!)

It is easy and necessary to make reading together the most fun time of every day. Read

together with funny voices, try humorous books to engage the reluctant readers in your family and trust that toilet humour is often a sure-fire winner for most boys. You should aim for no more than ten minutes reading together – just enough to encourage the kids to come back tomorrow. Set a timer if you need to, it will encourage them to ask



for a minute or two more when reading time comes to an end.

2. Visit bookstores and the local library

Make regular visits to bookstores and the local library part of your family's routine. These trips are simple ways to drive reading passion. Bookstores often sell brand new popular kids' books for less than \$10, much less than a movie ticket. Many children are amazed when they discover that they can borrow sometimes up to twenty books from their local library for free (and probably will the first time).



3. Allow children to choose what they want to read



Book choice is a vital component of the reading process. As adults, we very rarely read anything that we either don't love or enjoy. If we read a book and it takes a while to get going, or we lose interest, we simply put it down, or lend it to a friend. Why then do we insist that children must read cover to cover something that they don't necessarily enjoy or like?

Often these imposed choices on children come from a place of love – we are trying to support the children in accessing a text that is at their reading level. It is often hard to let go and let children

choose their own books, however it is vital to developing strong, self-sufficient readers. If you are picking up a book at the bookstore for your child during your lunch break, grab a few different titles. Having a choice to choose from will allow your children to have control over their reading process.



4. Have a 'screen free night' each week



Make a screen free night part of your family's regular routine where everyone in the family picks up something to read. Having your children see you read and talk about books adds value to this reading time. Different approaches to the screen free night may be to invest in reading lamps or book lights so that children can read in bed before sleep.



5. Give books as gifts

Birthdays for kids means presents, and more books in the house can never go astray. Gift the next book in the series that your child is loving – the 65 Storey Treehouse by Andy Griffiths or the Alice-Miranda series by Jacqueline Harvey are great places to start. Encourage your child to lend and swap their books with friends once they have read them.

6. Read together using supportive strategies

When you are reading together with your child, it's a great idea to give them the option of how they would like to read. Provide the opportunity for children to choose whether they would like to read aloud or silently. Check if they would like to try paired reading if they feel like they need extra support with the book.



When your child comes to a word that they don't know or aren't sure of, remember to:

- 1. Wait: give your child a chance to figure out the word on their own
- 2.**Ask:** does that make sense? Does the picture give you a clue? Could you read on for more information?
- 3.**Then skip:** if the child is still stuck on the word, ask them to skip it and read on. You can always drop that word into the conversation as you turn the page. This has the added advantage of not making the child wrong!

Working with your child to maintain good reading habits over their school break allows you to not only establish your family as
