Dear Parents and Carers,

Next week is National Road Safety Week.

Every year, approximately 1200 people are killed and another 44,000* are seriously injured on Australian roads. Traffic injury is the biggest killer of Australian children under 15 and the second-biggest killer of all Australians aged between 15 and 24. These numbers are growing every year but are preventable if we choose to Drive So Others Survive. The week highlights the impact of road trauma and ways to reduce it.

All students at Sadleir PS will be engaging in road safety learning next week. Please remember to take



extra care when driving near our school, that includes pick up and drop off safety.



This week the air conditioners that the P&C donated are being installed. Thanks again to the P&C for supporting our students.


During Mathematics, we have been looking at place value: the value of a digit within a number. For example, 72 the value of the 7 is 7 tens. We connected ten individual cubes together to make a ten. To represent ones (or units) we did not connect additional cubes. We had a lot of fun making our numbers. We followed this up with adding two values together, using our made cubes as our tools to help us count accurately.



At the end of term 1, in Science, we were curious where water came from and how we have rain. As part of our Earth's Resources unit we looked at properties of water and useful facts, as well as the water cycle. We even made our own Water Cycles (in zip lock bags)

We enjoy learning together in our class, and we enjoy learning from one another.








I've enjoyed learning about different types of fractions and how to use mental strategies to change between them. Carmelo




Hello everyone, as we are getting close to the middle of term 2, I have begun to assess the students understanding of dynamics and tempo. We have also been learning about pitch, which is how high or low a note sounds. In early stage 1 we have been aurally identifying high and low sounds and in stage 1 we have taken this a bit further by naming pitches A to G. This was achieved by looking at treble clef and where those notes or pitches sit on the staff. Playing pitched percussion gives students yet another

opportunity to identify pitch in a more practical way.

Due to great interest in recorder there are now three recorder groups. A Junior recorder group for years 1 and 2 and two senior recorder groups. One senior group is for newer players and members and the advanced group are the students who are currently rehearsing in preparation for the Festival of Instrumental music. This leaves only one



time slot for choir, but as the membership is not as big I imagined, I have combined the Junior and Senior Choir into one choir group. I was a little apprehensive initially combining such a broad age range, but so far the choir is sounding quite good. Seniors are helping the Juniors so the Juniors are singing out quite confidently.



Road safety

Walking together safely to and from school

Walking to school and back home again is a great way to spend time with your children and encourage safe and healthy behaviours.

Here are a few things you can do to help keep your children safer as a pedestrian:

- Talk with your children about being alert in the road environment.
- Plan and practice your trip to school so you use pedestrian crossings where possible.
- Always hold your child's hand. Children need your help to spot dangers such as vehicles coming out of driveways. They can also be easily distracted and wander into traffic.
- Meet your child near the school gate and don't call them from across the road.
- Explain why the place you have chosen is the safest place to cross.
- Remind your child to STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! THINK! every time they cross the road and keep checking until safely across.
- Talk to them about why they should stop, look, listen, think before crossing a driveway, road or carpark.

Young children can learn and practice these safe pedestrian behaviours with you. This will help them to be safer pedestrians when they are old enough to travel alone.
